come from".

For the newer members, and to refresh some of the more senior members the following may be of benefit:

A Brief History of Probus

Probus has its origins in the UK with the development of two social clubs established in Rotary. The Campus club was formed in 1965 by the Rotary Club of Welwyn Garden City, with Fred Carnhill the driving force. The second, with Harold Blanchard as the catalyst, was formed by the Rotary Club of Caterham in 1966 and was named the Probus Club "Pro" in professional and the "bus" in business. Both were formed to meet a need for mental stimulation and companionship for retired business and professional men.


The first club in the South Pacific was the Probus Club of Kapiti Coast, New Zealand, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Paraparaumu in 1974. The first Club in Australia was the Probus Club of Hunters Hill, NSW, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Hunters Hill in 1976 with the help of the Rotary Club of Dumbarton, Scotland. In 2007 the first Probus Club was formed in the Philippines (District 3820), sponsored by the Rotary Club of Lucena. Probus was male, female, and mixed gender clubs, and is now in 23 countries.

From its early beginnings as the Probus information center, the growth and strength of the Probus organization in our region is a testament to the Rotary Districts, Rotary Clubs, the Probus South Pacific Limited (PSPL) board of directors and the secretariat, along with many thousands of volunteers who have taken an active role in the management of each of their clubs.

Probus is proud to be recognized as a "community service activity of Rotary Clubs" in the South Pacific region. $\mathcal{J}o\mathcal{W}$

Bedford Probus Club – John has been in touch with Bedford to enquire as to whether a couple of their members would like to join our July meeting.



This outing captured a snapshot of a number of towns that feature on the WA Map and were well worth visiting. I have made a few notes of key points using Google to prompt me relating to the facts in the history of the places we visited., even the Bus coach driver hinted at us doing a test later in the journey.

The Pinjarra Massacre took place in Pinjarra, about 52 miles (83 kilometers) south of Perth, Western Australia, in 1834. The conflict pitted European colonists against a group of Australian Aboriginal people.

Indigenous Australian peoples lived in Australia for at least 40,000 years before Europeans arrived in Western Australia in the early 1800s. James Stirling helped to found Western Australia as Australia's first non-convict colony. He arrived in 1829 and was the colony's first governor. Perth was developed soon after. There were then many conflicts between Europeans and Aboriginal peoples because the Europeans wanted the land that Aboriginal peoples lived on.

To maintain a good relationship with the Indigenous Australian people, Stirling gave them some flour every day. At one point this amount was reduced, so the Aboriginal people raided a flour mill in South Perth on April 24, 1834. As punishment for the raid, some of the Aboriginal people were captured and tortured. On July 16 the Aboriginal people then killed a colonist, Hugh Nesbitt, and wounded a second. Stirling wanted to make an example of the tribe and punish them for the murder of Nesbitt. He also wanted to survey the land for further settlements.

In October Stirling gathered 24 men and set out for the area around what is now Pinjarra. After a few days' travel they came upon an Aboriginal camp on the Murray River. There were about 70 to 80 men, women, and children at the site. On the morning of October 28 the colonists approached the Aboriginal people, and the attack began. The exact number of Aboriginal people who were killed is not known—sources say anywhere from 13 to 30 were murdered. (we were told many more) Since some of the Aboriginal people had spears and tried to defend themselves, it has sometimes been called a battle rather than a massacre.

We stopped at Edenvale Homestead for morning tea

The historic homestead of Edenvale in Pinjarra offers an enlightening glimpse into the life of the former Premier of Western Australia, Sir Ross McLarty. This influential Western Australian politician lived in the homestead throughout his childhood and for much of his political life.

The homestead was initially built by McLarty's father, Edward in 1888. He too had a strong political career, which began six years after moving into the home. Wander around the 17 rooms of the Victorian style house that is considered typical of its era. Examine the quality craftsmanship of its builder and explore the remaining outbuildings surrounding the homestead.

Edenvale is now home to the Edenvale Heritage Tea Rooms, the Roger May Machinery Museum, Pinjarra Patchworkers and Quilters, Murray Districts Arts and Crafts, Murray District Historical Society. Enjoy a snack or lunch in the tearooms before examining the local works on display in the art gallery.

The picturesque town of Pinjarra is home to many unique historic sites, including the only heritage rose garden in the southwest. Pinjarra is just over an hour's drive south of Perth

We travelled on through Waroona up the Hill (Darling Range) to Lake Navarino— (Waroona Dam)

Waroona is a town located in the Peel region of Western Australia along the South Western Highway, between Pinjarra and Harvey. The town is the seat of the Shire of Waroona. At the 2016 census, Waroona had a population of 2,934. The town was originally known as **Drakesbrook**, and was first settled by John Fouracre in 1891. A railway station on the Pinjarra to Picton Junction railway line with the name "Drake's Brook", named after William Henry Drake, an Assistant Commissioner General and original landholder in the area (1847), opened in September 1893 and the town was surveyed and gazetted by March 1895. The surveyor-general of the day recommended the name change from Drake's Brook to Drakesbrook as "it is more euphonious and would look better on the plan". The change was made official in October 1896, and in the same year a post office was opened.

The first Waroona Dam, now the Drakesbrook Dam, was built in 1931–32 under the guidance of the Waroona Irrigation District by unemployed people on work programmes during the Great Depression. The completion of the dam, together with drainage and irrigation works, were the start of a period of considerable development in Waroona. The present Waroona Dam, further up in the hills, was officially opened in 1966.

We visited Yarloop and saw from the bus windows what is left of the town and the vacant lots and some rusted remnants.

Yarloop is a town in the South West of Western Australia along the South Western Highway, between Waroona and Harvey. At the 2016 census, Yarloop had a population of 395.On 7 January 2016 a bushfire destroyed most of the town. The Waroona bushfire, 100 km south of Perth, burnt 69,000 ha, destroyed more than 160 homes and caused two fatalities in **Yarloop** in January **2016**. ... Destructive ember showers occurred on two consecutive evenings: at Waroona on 6 January, and then **Yarloop** on 7 January. The **Yarloop** ember storm destroyed the town.

We travelled back to Ellenbrook arriving safely home at 4 pm —- thank you Outings for organising this very informative day trip.

Some of the non-apologies are permanent apologies or non-active due to ill health etc


We appear to have a few members that have not renewed their membership this year. And the Secretary is updating the Membership Register in consultation with the Treasurer.

Discussion was held at the last Committee meeting relating to the Formation of a Theatre Group.


The intention was that such a Group be formed under the umbrella of the Club similar to the Walking Group ie under a Coordinator.
